Twin Peaks

Being almost at the geographical center of San Francisco, there is no finer place to see the city than atop **Twin Peaks**. Named for its two virtually identical summits, Twin Peaks stands at an elevation of about 922 feet, second highest in San Francisco. Although best known for its panoramic views, Twin Peaks also houses the Summit Reservoir that provides water to residents, local fire departments, and birdlife in the area.



Fisherman's Wharf

Meet at Pier 39 at 1:30 p.m.



Fisherman's Wharf is a popular neighborhood tourist attraction in San Francisco. It is best known for being the location of Pier 39, San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park, the Cannery Shopping Center, Ghirardelli Square, a Ripley's Believe it or Not museum, the Wax Museum at Fisherman's Wharf and restaurants that serve fresh seafood, most notably dungeness crab and clam chowder served in a sourdough bread bowl. This neighborhood is known to have arguably some of the best seafood in the world. Be sure to check out the sea lions along Pier 39!



Union Square and Chinatown

Meet at the Christmas tree in Union Square at 4:15 p.m.



Union Square is the central shopping, hotel and theatre district in San Francisco. This vibrant center is the largest collection of large department stores, swank boutiques, tourist trinket shops and salons in the Western United States that continues to make Union Square a major visitor draw and a vital, cosmopolitan place in downtown San Francisco.

San Francisco's **Chinatown** is one of North America's largest and oldest Chinatowns. Established in the 1850s, it has been featured in popular culture, such as in film, music, photography, and literature.
