What is accreditation?

 Collegial process of self-review and peer review for the improvement of academic quality and public accountability of institutions and programs. (CHEA)

What is accreditation?

 System of voluntary, non-governmental, self-regulation, and peer review unique to American educational institutions. An institution evaluates itself in accordance with standards of good practice regarding mission goals, and objectives. (ACCJC)

What is accreditation?

 Process by which the institution reflects on and publicly demonstrates effective use of instruction, services, resources, operations in continuing and ongoing efforts to serve students better



Why care about accreditation?

- Ensures academic quality and continuous improvement
- Effectiveness demonstrated through ongoing integrated planning and evaluation
- Supporting student learning and achievement

Why care about accreditation?

- Student transcripts are transferrable
- Student credentials/awards are accepted
- Maintains federal financial aid eligibility
- Quality assurance
 - Colleges meet the standards

Why care about accreditation?

- Losing accreditation can lead to:
 - Decline in enrollment
 - Reduction in funding
 - Elimination of staffing

What's involved in accreditation?

- Compliance
- Improvement

Accreditation + Classified Senate

- Part of participatory governance role
- Supports efforts to align student learning and support services
- Supports efforts to document effective use/allocation of resources
- Provides leadership and contributes to supporting continuous improvement for the college to realize its mission

What's up with the mission statement?

- Statement of what the college does and who it serves
- Framework for all institutional goals and activities
- Considers how, why, and for who we do our work

- Institutional Self-Evaluation Report
 - Part of the 7-year accreditation cycle
- Written report which is an institutional selfreflection demonstrating how the college complies with the standards
 - Honest assessment of strengths and weaknesses
 - Evidence of meeting the college mission

- How are we meeting the students where they are at?
- How can we improve how we carry out our work?
- Earn PGA hours
