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RE: 2017-18 Transfer Center Visits: Top Services Used and Student Demographics

Overview

The Transfer Center provided Institutional Research & Planning (IR&P) with a list of students who visited the Center during 2013-14 to 2017-18. The list contained student IDs and services sought at the Center. IR&P was asked to determine which transfer services are being utilized the most and which students are accessing the Center. The Transfer Center was particularly interested in disaggregating the student data by gender, ethnicity, age, low-income, DSPS, foster youth and veteran statuses. While data is provided for the past 5 years, 2017-18 data is the focus of this report.

Transfer Center: Top 3 Services

- In 2017-18, the total number of transfer center visits declined from 3,750 to 3,109 (-17%). The top three services used are counseling appointments, transfer resources and workshop.
 - Counseling appointment's share of visits has increased over the years, accounting for 40% of all visits in 2017-18.
 - Transfer resources is not being used as much, 24% (2017-18) vs. 54% (2013-14).
 - Workshop accounts for 14% of all visits.

Transfer Center: Usage & Access Gap by Student Demographics

Table 2 provides information on the Center's usage and access gap by student demographics. The access gap compares the Center's student population to the general student population with an educational goal of transfer. If an access gap is identified for a specific student group, it suggests the Transfer Center is serving fewer students from that group than is expected. The data highlighted below focuses on any student groups with an access gap that is equal to or greater than -3.0. Overall, Transfer Center access could be improved for females, Latinx and those who are from low-income households.

Gender

- Usage: Females are slightly more likely to use the Center than males, 53% vs. 46%.
- Access Gap: The Center is not serving as many males students (-3.1).

Ethnicity

- Usage: Asian (35%), Latinx (30%) and White (24%) students primarily use the Center.
- Access Gap: The Center is not serving as many Latinx (-4.1) students.

Age

- Usage: More than half (61%) of the Transfer Center students are 20 to 24 year olds, followed by those who are between 25 to 34 (24%).
- Access Gap¹: The Center is not serving as many 25 to 34 year olds (-2.7).

Low Income

- Usage: 25% of the Transfer Center students are low income.
- Access Gap: The Center is not serving as many low income students (-5.9).

DSPS

- Usage: 7% of the Transfer Center students are DSPS students.
- Access Gap: Those who are not DSPS students have an access gap of -3.7.

Foster Youth

- Usage: 1% of the Transfer Center students are foster youth students.
- Access Gap: There is no gap.

Veteran

- Usage: 1% of the Transfer Center students are veteran students.
- Access Gap: There is no gap.

¹ Note, those age 19 or less have an access gap of -5.8; however they are not being highlighted as they account for 12% of the total Center's population.
