Dear Colleagues,



Advisory Council

On April 9, Bret Watson informed the members of Advisory Council about budget updates for the spring quarter. Kristy Lisle led a discussion of the winter 2020 program review presentations, and Advisory Council voted to host the spring presentations on May 7 and May 12. Ram Subramaniam, and other members of the faculty prioritization team, presented Advisory Council with its ranked list of faculty positions to consider hiring



this year. After discussion, Advisory Council voted to move the trauma-informed counselor position to the third rank. The tri-chairs of Advisory Council are now tasked with presenting these results to President Nguyen for her consideration.

Tune in to the Silicon Valley Astronomy Lectures YouTube channel on Wednesday, April 28, at 7 p.m. for a live lecture from astronomer and author **Dr. Janna** Levin. 
