Dear Colleagues,

The Parliament is cautiously optimistic that the next few months will see an acceleration in the vaccination program and that more businesses will be able to open their doors soon. As you might know, the return-to-campus conversations have been ongoing. The Scheduling Task Force's prioritization list will inform the Emergency Operations team's (EOC) work on how we support the proposed returning classes (budget, PPE, communications, etc.). Their information will then go to shared governance for a recommendation. The 5th Council (now officially renamed the Return to Campus Council) will assess the EOC/Scheduling Task Force proposal and make recommendations to President Nguyen. Finally, any Foothill plan also has to be approved at the district level. The goal is to involve as many voices in the decision-making process as possible while ensuring the district is working within federal, state, and county guidelines.


The district's **guiding principles** for the return-to-campus effort direct us to keep the needs of our students at the forefront of the decision-making process and also provide an equitable and supportive environment that prioritizes the health and safety of students and employees. The Parliament promises to provide weekly updates on Foothill's progress, so stay tuned.

Governance Updates

C&C Council

At the March 5 meeting, student representatives updated the council with Women's History Heritage Month events and mensuration products project in the works for Spring Quarter.

The governance evaluation is still in progress. The tri-chairs met with the RP group and Dr. Fong, and the preliminary report should be ready by April with full findings in May. The governance evaluation will be put on a future agenda for discussion and possible action items.



The council voted to help organize and participate in the mid-year governance summit after the governance evaluation is completed. The council also voted to amend the Service Leadership Study Group charter to include anyone who would like to participate, and to work with Colber Prosper to help facilitate the study group as well as organize any campus-wide events.

R&R Council

At its March 5 meeting, the R&R Council had a preliminary discussion on funding the Japanese Cultural Center, Azumaya and the Observatory. The council approved to fund equity initiatives using one-time carryover B budget fund for a minimum of 3 years with an opportunity to reassess at some point. With this approval, there was agreement that details would need to be determined with leadership by the council, including how much funding and a process for determining what initiatives to fund. This discussion will continue in our April meeting.

Return to Campus Council

The group met on March 11. In order to better adhere to the council's purpose, the name was changed from the "5th Council" to "Return to Campus Council." Andrew McReynolds gave a presentation around instruments for student feedback collection and offered a unique, student-driven perspective on return to campus. Finally, three workgroups were formulated in order to best carry out the information gathering needs of the council: Facilities, Student Needs and Communication.


